Dear Mayor Romano

On August 6, 2025, the Millburn Schools rejected a request for my 5-year-old son to attend kindergarten in Millburn, citing a “residency rule.” On August 27, fifty clergy and civil rights marchers from across the region and state accompanied me back to Millburn to demand that its school district comply with the New Jersey Constitution and open its classrooms to my son and to children from segregated schools across the region.

We delivered [a letter with a proposal for Millburn](#) to do this by becoming a *choice district* and inviting students from high-poverty districts to make Millburn better reflect the demographics of the region, state, and county.

The letter describes how Millburn’s residency restriction, coupled with its historic resistance to affordable housing, has resulted in Millburn becoming a racially and economically exclusionary school district in violation of state law that explicitly guarantees an adequate education free from racial segregation for all children. Millburn's discriminatory behavior has not only kept Black, brown, and poor students out, it has also caused poverty to concentrate in urban districts as well as their many working- and middle-class suburban neighbors.

To remedy this, Millburn must become a *choice district* and use the tools afforded it by the State of New Jersey with the *Interdistrict Public School Choice Program* to implement an integration plan as we have outlined in the [letter to the Millburn School Board](#).

We look forward to meeting with you to discuss this in more detail. In the meantime, [please go here to sign on](#) to support this very realistic but meaningful proposal for creating inclusive opportunities for all children. By signing, you agree that Millburn must take these or comparable steps to become a choice district that reflects the demographic diversity of its region and of our state.

The abhorrent and unconstitutional segregation of New Jersey’s schools must be addressed by our state legislators and the governor. However, they have all failed to act, despite Building One New Jersey offering comprehensive and feasible state-level solutions to eliminate this immoral and unjust evil. Until our legislative leaders and governor summon the courage to meaningfully tackle school segregation, we must demand that Millburn and similar districts take the necessary steps to begin to reverse the harm caused by their years of exclusionary policies and practices.
